Care Act 2014

New responsibilities and implications for local authorities, adult care providers, safeguarding boards, people who use services, carers and their advocates are introduced by the Care Act 2014, which is one of the most significant changes to social care in the last 60 years. All existing care and support legislation is consolidated into one single, legal framework - the Care Act 2014. The aim of the framework is to create a care and support system that is driven by goals, needs and well-being.

New rights for carers are set out in the Care Act 2014 and the framework also puts an emphasis on prevention rather than cure, and introduces a national threshold of eligibility for care and support.
